

Annual Statement 2022





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Introduction

Trafford's Older Peoples' Housing Strategy 2020-2025 was launched in March 2020. It identified how, over the next 5 years, the Council and its partners will work together to provide a range of quality, affordable and attractive housing options to enable older people to live independently in Trafford. The Strategy forms part of a suite of specialist and supported housing strategies that sit under Trafford's main Housing Strategy 2018-2023 and plays a role in delivering the priorities set out in the Greater Manchester Housing Strategy 2019-2024.

The four Strategic Priorities identified within Trafford's Older Peoples' Housing Strategy are:

- 1. Improve the quality and standard of existing housing for older people in Trafford.
- 2. Increase the availability and range of suitable housing options for older people within Trafford.
- 3. Enable older people in Trafford to live independently.
- 4. Create and foster partnerships that work to deliver effective health and social care provision, support services and high quality housing to older people across Trafford.



Annual Review 2022

Trafford's Older Peoples' Housing Strategy 2020-2025 must be reviewed on a regular basis to ensure effective delivery. This annual review provides an update on the following:

- Changes to the national and sub-regional initiatives, policies, and strategies in respect of housing for older people.
- Statistical data in relation to Trafford's population, life expectancy, property prices, and housing register.
- Delivery of the Older Peoples' Housing Strategy.
- The Older Peoples' Housing Strategy Action Plan Update:
 - What have we achieved?
 - What area we working towards?
 - What do we still have to do?

Strategic Context

The impact following the Covid-19 Pandemic

As Trafford returns to a new normal way of life following the COVID-19 Pandemic, the impact of the measures taken are now being published through a number of reports. The information and statistical data gathered provide a valuable insight into the ongoing impact on older persons and areas of challenge. The context and data highlights key issues that are prominent in the current climate and enables us to continue to focus our work on within the strategy to help our Older Persons in the Borough. The following data and information has been gathered in the months following the lifting of lockdown restrictions.

New data from Ipsos MORI commissioned by the Centre for Ageing Better suggests that people approaching retirement in Greater Manchester are facing poorer health and financial insecurity as a result of the coronavirus lockdown.¹

Using public spaces and utilising face to face services such as using banks and the post office. Around 900,000 people use their local post office to collect the pension every week, with 870,000 continuing to do so during the Covid-19 lockdown. Post offices are of particular importance to more rural communities, who still use post offices significantly more often than urban consumers.

Trafford Council is keen to push forward the actions outlined within the Older Peoples' Housing Strategy and remain driven to deliver the Strategy's vision to work together to provide a range of quality, affordable and attractive housing options to enable older people to live independently.

Cost of Living and Financial Security

Around 2 million people aged 65 and older live in poverty in the UK, and many are struggling with the growing cost of living crisis.² GMCA Research suggests that there are around 36,000 eligible households not claiming Pension Credit in Greater Manchester - that's a third of those who are eligible. Greater Manchester Ageing Hub and the Greater Manchester Housing Providers (GMHP) are launching the second phase of the Pension Top Up campaign to ensure that older people are checking what they are entitled to.³

The Greater Manchester Older People's Equality Panel (OPEP) was set up in March 2022 and its first meeting was held in April 2022. One of the priorities of the panel refers to the cost of living and the impact of older people. Focus will be on the absolute poverty and existing levels of poverty. A priority action point will be to increase the take-up of existing older age benefit, such as pension credit and attendance allowance.⁴

In a detailed report 'The State of Ageing 2022' conducted by Ageing Better⁵ they have highlighted that almost 9,000 people died in England and Wales last year because their homes were too cold. Almost 1 in 5 people of pension age were living in relative poverty in 2019/20, following a sharp increase (of 200,000 people) over the previous year. The statistics show that there is widening wealth and income inequalities, and that older people are facing larger financial challenges.

Statistical Update

The majority of statistics contained within Trafford's Older Peoples' Housing Strategy derive from the 2011 Census. The initial findings from the 2021 Census will continue to form a for a more comprehensive update on statistical data in the next Annual Statement.

Population Estimate

Trafford is continuing to see a steady increase in the number of residents aged 65+. The data available
'Mid-year Population Estimates' provided in 2021, which remains most up to date by the Office of
National Statistics shows people aged over 65 make up 17.6% ⁶ of Trafford's total population which is
a 0.2% increase from the statistics from 2019 detailed in the Older Peoples' Housing Strategy.

Property Prices

- A search on Rightmove in June 2022 returned no retirement properties available to rent in Trafford. As of
 December 2022, the same search returned an Anchor Housing (a Registered Provider of retirement
 properties to rent and buy) had one property available for rent, that is 1-bedroom at £555.68 per month.
 The research shows that there is a decrease in the availability of retirement properties along with an
 increase in cost.
- The Older Peoples' Housing Strategy identified that 2-bedroom properties are the most preferred option for Trafford residents aged 55+. The average rental price for a 2-bedroom property in Trafford is currently £1,195 calendar month⁷, this an average increase of £290 per calendar month in one year. The current 2-bedroom Local Housing Allowance rate is £648.22 per month. This highlights the continued disparity between market rents in Trafford and the Local Housing Allowance rate of the area. The rental market prices are increasing, whilst the Local Housing Allowance Rate remains the same.
- House prices in Trafford have continued to increase since the launch of the Older Peoples' Housing Strategy, with the average house price in December 2022 now sitting at £353,407⁸. When the Older Peoples' Housing Strategy was launched in March 2020, the average house price in Trafford was £299,475⁹. This demonstrates that house prices have increased by approximately 18% since the Strategy was launched. This has increased 7% in one year since the last Annual Statement was released.

Housing Register

- There are currently 7809 applicants on Trafford's housing register (as of December 2022). Of these, 1419 are aged 55 or over.
- Over 55's registered with Trafford Home Choice by banding: Band 1, 28, Band 2, 242, Band 3, 854, Band 4, 184, Band 5, 115
- Since the Older Peoples' Housing Strategy was launched in March 2020, 259 applicants aged 55+ have been allocated social rented properties via Trafford Home Choice.

Housing Options

• In the year 2021/22 for over 55's, there were 296 presentations to HOST, 190 of these were advice only cases



- In the year 2021/22 for over 55's, there were 720 applicants registered on Trafford Homechoice and 138 of these have been housed in the last financial year.
- Figure one shows the number of approaches that were made to the Housing Options Service by those aged 55+ and over and the reasons for approach.
- The highest percentage of approaches accounted for 24% of service users requiring assistance as family or friends were no longer willing to accommodate.
- 22% of approaches accounted for service users requiring assistance due to a private assured shorthold tenancy coming to an end. This demonstrates that there is instability in private rented accommodation, requiring the assistance of HOST.





Achievements

458 older people received Welfare Rights support in 2021/22 and a Pension Credit Campaign launched to target those eligible to apply and maximise income

138 older people were rehoused through Trafford Home Choice in 2021/22

190 older people approach HOST for housing advice in 2021/22

Trafford Council made £500,000 available to expand and enhance the range of Technology Enhanced Care Trafford Council have funded six Community Hubs which signposts older people for advice and information. All Registered Providers who provide accommodation for over 55's meets the 'Decent Homes' standard

Dementia Support launched their carer training courses and 'Games for the Brain' groups within Trafford Age UK in Urmston have started to provide classes on strength balance and posture. They also have established a health bus which travels across the borough promising health and wellbeing.

On developments of 50 or more residential units the Council will now expect at least 2% of new dwellings to be built to wheelchair accessible standards -Part M4(3)



Older Peoples' Housing Strategy Action Plan Update 2022

A review of the Older Peoples' Housing Strategy Action Plan 2020-2025 has been undertaken to determine what has been achieved and what we have still left to do. A copy of the Action Plan update is contained within Appendix A.

What challenges have we faced?

- Phasing into the new normal following the Covid-19 pandemic has delayed much of the work needed to drive forward the actions within the Action Plan. All services across Trafford Council have faced challenges in terms of capacity, budget restraints, and new working practices following the COVID-19 pandemic
- Following the launch of the 'Homes for Ukraine' scheme to house those fleeing war, the Housing Standards Team and The Housing Options Service Trafford (HOST) have had additional pressures in focussing their work on this scheme. Housing Standards are required to visits homes of sponsors which has increased workload, and approaches to the Housing Options service have meant work is prioritised on other key areas.
- Local Registered Providers had to refocus their efforts on managing the Covid-19 pandemic and
 ensuring older tenants are safe and well as the restrictions were lifted, and so have not been able to
 progress with some of their actions as anticipated.

What have we achieved?

- Explore buying or building residential care homes to have better control of care and rent costs, and to ensure future provision of this stock and to influence where it is located.
 Trafford Council have recently purchased two care homes in Sale and are exploring options for other purchases.
- ✓ Review the allocation criteria, including age thresholds, for specialist accommodation to maximise value for money.
 A review has taken place which determined that as specialist accommodation within Trafford remains in high demand there is no current reason to vary the allocation criteria.
- Explore how to extend services aimed at helping older people maintain their home to those not currently eligible to the support.
 It has been determined that eligibility for support is means tested. It is not viable to extend the eligibility criteria at present due to budget restraints.



- Explore the use of already skilled/qualified older people to help with the installation of adaptations rather than using potentially expensive contractors.
 This action has been explored; however, the action is not likely to see an uptake.
- ✓ Explore providing grant assistance to older and vulnerable customers to ensure their homes are safe, warm and dry, and develop and promote targeted information such as maintenance booklets, and energy efficiency advice for these households.

 Trafford Council currently offer a Homeowner Grant of up to £3000 to help eligible homeowners conduct repairs. Housing Standards offer Homeowner Grants for improvements to residential properties where there are significant hazards present and where the applicant is eligible. The team also regularly provides advice to residents about other available grants or assistance to help improve the conditions of their homes including referrals to LEAP and the GM Warm Homes Fund.
- ✓ Consider advertising the Age UK maintained list of recommended tradesmen to Trafford residents.

 It has been determined that Trafford Council will not recommend specific contractors. However, a link to the Age UK webpage which provides assistance on finding a trusted tradesperson has been added to Trafford Council's website.
- ✓ Work with private landlords in Trafford to improve the quality of private rented housing for older people.
 Housing Standards work closely with local private landlords to advise and, where necessary, intervene to ensure the quality of all private rented properties is acceptable. HOST has a private sector lead that will liaise with landlords and Housing Standards where required to intervene and ensure properties are at an acceptable standard.
- ✓ Explore the possibilities of co-housing.

 Learnings from the Covid-19 Pandemic have highlighted the risks associated with co-housing, particularly for older people. Trafford Council have therefore decided not to pursue co-housing as an option for older people at this stage.
- ✓ Ensure older people have enough money for fuel by encouraging them to access benefits and grants. Trafford's Welfare Rights service help all local residents and began monitoring the age of those accessing the service aged over 55. Approximately 438 customers approached Trafford Welfare rights since the monitoring began. This is 51% of the overall customers. Assessments for social care include benefit maximisation exercises by Adult Services. Trafford Council have funded four Community Hubs which signpost Older Persons for advice and information.
- ✓ Explore opportunities to develop lease management products for older people.
 - This action has been explored, however due to the current financial situation and budget constraints it is not practical to explore this action.



- ✓ Improve advice and access to Technology Enhanced Care (TEC) services that assist independent living.
 - Trafford Council made £500,000 available to expand and enhance the range of TEC available to Trafford residents. Trafford Council have developed several projects since the TEC Strategy was launched in 2018 including: Rapid telecare to support people out of hospital, Home Safe Hospital Discharge Bags, Carers and TEC, Dementia and TEC, Falls and TEC, Meds management and TEC, Infection control and TEC, and social isolation and TEC.
- ✓ Produce a Technology Enhanced Care Strategy. Trafford Council's 3-year Technology Enabled Care Strategy was published in August 2018. A Position Statement is expected by 2022/23 following the end of the current Strategy in late 2021.
- ✓ Engage and support Registered Providers and developers to ensure new developments are equipped to support the use of advancing technology.
 Trafford Housing Trust work in partnership with Trafford Council to manage the borough's TEC provision, identify new technologies, and to install, maintain, and monitor TEC for residents.
 Great Places are committed to including capacity for TEC in future developments; Irwell Valley's new developments will be telecare enabled and futureproofed; Your Housing Group consider TEC and advancing technology as part of all their new developments.
