Talbot Road Cyclops junction: Making cycling safer and easier

Exciting news! The Talbot Road cyclops junction is now open, marking a fantastic step forward for cyclists in Trafford.

With recent works by One Trafford, we're seeing major junction improvements across White City Way, Great Stone Road, and Chester Road. These upgrades are turning junctions into cyclist-friendly zones with smart signals, bike lanes, and revamped traffic islands.

Talbot Road, a key location for connecting Trafford with Manchester City Centre is now safer and more accessible than ever. With the completion of the Talbot Road and White City Way junction, opportunity is being provided for people to enjoy these improvements.

Work is progressing well at Chester Road/Talbot Road junction, and the final scheme at Great Stone Road is now underway.

During the Trafford Careers Fair in Altrincham, our team, accompanied by two apprentices, engaged with 40 aspiring individuals. The event showcased Amey's diverse apprenticeship opportunities in rail design, Civil Engineering, Project Management, Data Analytics, Highways Operations, and Business Administration.

Amey's apprenticeship programme provides opportunities for talent across Trafford offering hands-on experience alongside experts, involvement in real projects, and the chance to earn a qualification. Apprentices also have the opportunity to push their qualification to degree level depending on the apprenticeship they choose.

We caught up with Patric and Macauley, embodying the spirit of apprenticeship within One Trafford.

Patric, who is this year's highest achiever on his course, shares, "You get a lot of opportunities here in

Trafford, especially with the One Trafford Partnership, allowing diversity in your work and skill enhancement."


In line with our commitment to community welfare, ongoing support for Trussell Trust continued, with a donation to Stretford Foodbank, ensuring vital assistance reached those in need.
